

FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Well, if we had an unusual end to Term 1, we most certainly also had an unusual start to Term 2. As we all left for the holidays having prepared for remote



and online learning in Term 2, it was announced mid break that schools would be resuming face to face teaching for Term 2.

As a staff we took the opportunity to reflect on the impact of COVID-19 and our provision of a remote and online learning experience. We look a back at Term 1 and all that we had achieved with an impressive range of new initiatives, new policies and practices and how far we had progressed in our improvement planning processes. And then along came COVID-19! Instead of viewing it as detraction or blocker to the good work that we had been doing, I highlighted to staff the key elements of a high performing school that I had seen from Waroona District High School during the online and remote experience. We were front runners in managing the change and our efforts to maintain continuity of learning was being recognised and acknowledged within the community as exceeding that of other schools. Staff had maximised the use of WebEx, Connect and Dojo and were providing consistent weekly overviews of content and activities, daily lessons and content and regularly scheduled teacher/student interactions. I saw us living our vision; I saw high expectations of students and staff and teacher efficacy. I saw high level accountability and high expectations of consistency. I saw collaboration, support, innovation and achievement. We were operating ahead of schedule and providing remote and online delivery from Week 8 to Week 10. I saw a community that valued and applauded the work that we were doing. I saw positive outcomes for our students.

Having said that though, we are all really glad to have our students back in the classroom. Attendance at school is now compulsory and we need to focus on getting all students without medical exemptions back to school. As things return to some sort of normality we are still unable to provide camps, excursions and extra-curricular events. Virtual assemblies will be in place until gatherings sizes increase from the current limit of 20. Whilst this is not ideal, it is the same situation in every school in the state.

I have to say as Principal, this has been a challenging, but also very proud period of time for me. I have seen my staff operate under extreme stress and adapt to immense change with little to no warning and they have embraced the change and accepted the circumstances as true professionals, in order to provide the best outcomes for our students. The teaching staff, support staff, cleaning staff, student services staff and executive staff have all responded to the increased workload, stress and emergency management conditions in the most positive and productive way. I thank them all most sincerely.

Our students also responded to the changing circumstances in a positive manner and embraced the remote and online environment to maintain continuity of their own learning. Supported by some very stressed, but patient parents to assist

them, our students have come through the journey with work completed and hopefully a new found appreciation for being at school. Again, I sincerely thank our students and our parents for their support in this challenging period.

The cancellation of NAPLAN testing for Year 3, 5, 7 and 9 students in 2020 now means that all Year 9 students will have to sit OLNA (Online Literacy and Numeracy Assessment). Further details around this change will be provided to parents and students once details are confirmed by the School Curriculum and Standards Authority (SCSA).

Our recent OLNA results for Year 10 students showed significant improvement in student progress and achievement of OLNA. Students must pass OLNA to meet the WACE requirements in Year 12. We are delighted that so many of our students have already met this requirement.

On an exciting note, we are currently having our secondary toilets upgraded with a complete refurbishment. This has placed the toilets out of service for a considerable period of time. Due to COVID-19 we decided to hire additional toilets rather than sharing existing facilities. We look forward to seeing the new facilities once completed toward the end of this term.

The remaining funds that we received for classroom refurbishments has been targeted to an upgrade of the library facility. Although the funding is quite limited, we are hoping to get as big a bang for our buck as we can with some refreshments to the existing space. Our longer term vision is to create an ICT and resource hub with several modern learning spaces able to be used simultaneously by classes across the school.

Our School Council welcomes two newly elected staff members, Joanne Evans and Coranda Fee, as well as two new parent representatives who will be announced very soon. Brad Vitale, our recently elected Chair of the Council, and I have been working on our selection narrative to become an Independent Public School, an opportunity that will give us increased autonomy and flexibility to self-manage our school and cater to the specific needs of the Waroona community. The School Council this week endorsed our Positive Behaviour Schools Policy, an updated policy and processes for consistent management of student behaviour, which is a current improvement focus area for the school. The School Council also endorsed the Waroona District High School Strategic Plan 2019-2021 (Version 2). This plan is a roadmap for our improvement agenda and outlines our school vision – to be the school of choice in the local community, as well as our priority areas and targets. Following significant leadership change in recent years, we embraced the opportunity to revision the school and identify areas of strategic priority to enable us to achieve our vision. This document will hold us accountable to each other and to our community for improving the social and academic outcomes for our students. I commend this document to you and look forward to your enduring support as we continue on our journey of improvement.

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

Our Year 9 & 10 Bush Ranger students have been building a water filtration system using simple materials such as grass, charcoal, fine sand, pebble and rocks.

In this particular activity, students developed outdoor survival skills for when they cannot access clean water because of a natural disaster or because they are in a bush area where clean water is not readily accessible.

Some of our Bush Rangers succeeded while others need improvements. Students are expected to use their STEM skills to improve their design after their first trial and have another go again in Week 9 of Term 2.
