I want to give you all an update on student attendance. Over this current semester we have started to see improvements in our attendance rates from Semester One, which is fantastic. Staff at Waroona District High School will continue to set high expectations for attendance throughout the rest of this semester and into 2024, as we look to continue to drive improvements in student attendance.

On Friday 27th October, Waroona District High School was honoured to have a visit from the Hon Sussan Ley MP and members of the Chamber of Minerals and Energy of WA. They came to observe some of our Year 1 and Year 2 students participate in a Chamber of Minerals and Energy Digital Technology Challenge. This was a STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Maths), challenge using Bee (programmable Bee robots). The challenge focuses on Automation and Data Science and is designed to help build students digital technology skills with a real-world application. In this challenge there was a link to the ongoing automation of the mining industry, and an insight into the work behind the scenes that takes place to program autonomous machines and robots. Our guests were impressed with the way our students took to the challenge and could see the benefit of this engaging curriculumbased activity and its real-world application.

It is again that time of the year where our preparations for the Presentation and Graduation Assembly begin and we start getting ready for our Year 6 camp (our Year 10 camp took place last week). Christmas celebrations and our Christmas Concert are also not that far away. I applaud all the staff who are working hard to pull together several school functions to celebrate the end of year and the achievements of our students. It is not that long ago that we were in the midst of a global pandemic and this year's graduates (Year 6 students and 10 students) have demonstrated an incredible level of endurance and resilience over their respective secondary and primary schooling. The impact of the global pandemic has undeniably impacted their journey through school. Yet, they have conducted themselves with dignity and respect and embraced the opportunities that have come their way. We all wish them the best for the next step of their educational journey. In the coming weeks teachers will take part in a coaching exercise with the Shaping Minds group to further refine classroom practise and develop their skills around explicit instruction. Finally, with the last term of the school year in full swing and the Christmas holidays nearly in sight. I would encourage everyone to remember that "Everyday counts" and to attend school every day. The school has several events coming up including the 90% attendance BBQ. 
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

HEALTH – LET'S TALK ABOUT ... COLOUR BLINDNESS

Children who are colour blind can see as clearly as other people but can't tell the difference between some colours or see colours differently from other people. Very few people who are colour blind are 'blind' to all colours – most often they see red and green as very similar.

It's good to know if a child is colour blind because they may have difficulty at school with activities that use colours, such as drawing and sorting blocks, and with computers. Please read through information on <u>colour blindness</u> provided by Raising Children Network.



If you have any concerns, colour vision testing can be performed by some General Practitioners (GP), eye specialists or optometrist. You can also contact your local Community Health Nurse, **Casey Hardman PH: 0457536132**


