We achieved above-expected progress in 7 areas compared to our "Like Schools" (schools similar to Waroona within WA). In another 12 areas, we performed at the higher end of expected progress. These results reflect the hard work and commitment of both students and staff and I congratulate them for the fantastic achievement.

Earlier this week we sent home a copy of the 2023 Annual Report which provides us with an opportunity to share our achievements and progress with the school community. I encourage you all to take a look at the report to see how we are progressing as a school and working to achieve our Business Plan targets.

Hello everyone and welcome back to what has been a very busy start to Term 3. This term has seen a flurry of activity with a number of camps and excursion taking place. Along with this, students have been hard at work progressing through their lessons at the start of a new semester.

The start of this term also saw NAPLAN results being released. The release of these results highlights individual student achievement and how well the school went on a class and cohort level. It is pleasing to say that Waroona District High School performed extremely well against National Minimum Standard, State Average and Like Schools in comparative data. Areas of real strength were shown in Writing and Mathematics, whilst performance in Reading, Spelling and Grammar also improved. All students should be very proud of their efforts.

In Week Two the school had the 90% Attendance Reward lunch. Students who achieved this milestone were treated to cheeseburgers for lunch. We had 182 students receive this reward, which is a large percentage of our school population. This demonstrates that a large number of our students are hitting the target of coming to school every day. Studies have established the connection between school attendance and student performance, making every day count is vitally important.

Parents, please remember to contact the school to let us know about any unexplained absences, we understand that this time of year is difficult with sickness and bugs going around, so if a student is away, please notify the school. Finally, if a student is arriving late to school, after 8.50am, they will need to enter through the office so that they can get a late note to take to their teachers.

## SCHOOL BASED IMMUNISATION PROGRAMME

#### Free vaccinations at school to protect your child against serious infectious diseases

Each year nurses attend secondary schools across WA to provide free adolescent vaccinations as recommended under the National Immunisation Program.

The Department of Health has identified public school students in Years 7 and 10 whose parents have not provided a response (consent or declination) to the request for their child to be immunised. They will be sending a text message to these parents which will include links to the <u>secure online consent form</u>, as well as the <u>HealthyWA School Based</u> <u>Immunisation</u> webpage. Should a hard copy form be preferred, this is available through the school.

#### Year 7 students

Year 7 students can get the Human papillomavirus (HPV) vaccine and a booster dose of the diphtheria-tetanus-pertussis vaccine. These protect against whooping cough, tetanus, genital warts and some cancers.

### Year 10 students

Year 10 students can get the meningococcal vaccine to protect against four strains of the disease. Meningococcal disease can be extremely serious, spread to others and older teenagers have the highest rates of infection.



### HEALTH - LET'S TALK ABOUT ... SCOLIOSIS

Scoliosis is an abnormal sideways curvature of the spine. It can be detected by a simple examination of the back.

The normal spine has three curves – one in the neck, on in the upper back and one in the lower back. These curves can be seen from the side, but when you look from behind the spine should appear straight. If the spine has a sideways curve, this is scoliosis.

Please read through the <u>scoliosis</u> information provided by Raising Children Network and check your child for scoliosis as described.
